Well Holy Cross Fam,

If you think about it, Memorial Day was basically the end of the year... before we know it, we are approaching July 4th, Labor Day, Rally Day, Annual Meetings, Thanksgiving, and Christmas... in just 6 short events, it's 2026.

June was kicked off with the Washington DC ELCA Annual Synod meeting, where we elected a new Bishop, Rev. Phil Hirsch. It's an inspiring meal and I encourage any members beyond council to join in and share as well.





How does Holy Cross serve our community through English Classes? (ELL)

Imagine, if you can, that you have left a home, your family, a country and a culture you have always known to start a new life.

Maybe you left for a better, safer life for your children.

Maybe you left because your country is embroiled in war.

Maybe you left because you wanted to escape the cycle of poverty and lack of opportunity that was all you could see in your family's future.

The United States offers that hope and opportunity to you but there's one giant stumbling block—your first language is Spanish, Farsi, or Arabic, French, or Russian, or Mandarin, or Vietnamese or any one of dozens of other languages of the world. And if you have any hope of succeeding you have to learn English.

In 2002, after Northern Virginia Family Services discontinued their English classes offered at Holy Cross, several church members decided to start our own program.

In its twenty-three (23!) years, our English classes have served hundreds of students.

They have improved their job prospects, some have become citizens (over 30), some have been able to move on to more education.

But it is not just the students who benefit. Because their prospects have improved, their children benefit from their mothers and fathers improved opportunities. Because the family is more comfortable in their new world, they can be active participants in the children's schools and the larger community instead of isolated strangers.

Thank you for your continued support. With more resources and teaching tools, our teachers can expand the way students learn. We have accomplished much; with your help we can always do so much more.


