Adjectives are a powerful part of the English language. They can change one's image of an ordinary house to a grand mansion in the woods with a peaceful river flowing through the backyard. Many hymn writers struggle to articulate a piece of our faith poetically. It is an art that began in the early church and still exists today. Isaac Watts, one of the church's greatest hymn



writers, wrote the hymn When I Survey the Wondrous Cross, achieving new heights of passionate devotional poetry while using merely five adjectives. This does not include adjectival words used as predicates. The purely descriptive adjectives are: 'wondrous,' 'richest,' 'vain,' 'rich,' and 'amazing' – yet it must be agreed that this is one of the most penetrating hymns of the Lutheran hymnal. Each stanza is written with strong, clear, simple thoughts.

When I Survey the Wondrous Cross, written originally for use in the Communion Service, was inspired by Paul's impassioned declaration in Galatians 6:14, "God forbid that I should glory, save in the cross of our Lord, Jesus Christ, by whom the world is crucified to me, and I to the world." This statement is a climax to his argument that one does not have to become a Jew before he can become a Christian. From this profound statement Isaac Watts derives five stanzas of poetry to portray the Prince of Glory and his throne, the cross.

When I survey the wondrous Cross, On which the prince of glory died, My richest gain I count but loss, And pour contempt on all my pride.

"Survey" suggests not only sight but also contemplation: the deliberate attempt on the part of the communicant to realize what Christ's death meant to the world. The cross is "wondrous" because in this one instance a Roman instrument of torture and

death has become God's instrument for saving mankind. "Prince of Glory" suggests the highest exaltation. Watts believed that Christ had been a "Prince" in heaven before the world was created (Col 1:15-17).

Forbid it, Lord, that I should boast Save in the death of Christ my God; All the vain things that charm me most, I sacrifice them to his blood.



Each person can make a list of his or her "vain things" that we boast in. Watts calls us in this stanza to sacrifice all earthly things for Christ and only boast in Christ's death on a cross.

See from his head, his hands, his feet, Sorrow and love flow mingled down; Did e'er such love and sorrow meet, Or thorns compose so rich a crown?

Stanza three is one of Watts' most beautiful stanzas. The sorrow and love the flow mingled down from his head, hands, and feet is an allusion to the blood that flowed from his side after a soldier pierced him with a spear to prove that he was dead. Watts takes

the word "mingled" and transforms a revolting physical death into a spiritual flow of sorrow and love. At the end of this stanza Watts declares the worth of Christ's crown of thorns to be greater than any monarch's crown of jewels.

Were the whole realm of nature mine, That were a present far too small; Love so amazing, so divine, Demands my soul, my life, my all.

In this stanza Watts' intent to assess the value of Christ's sacrifice reaches a personal climax. Although human sin through the ages amounts to more than the material worth of the entire universe, Christ's atonement is still more than adequate. Therefore God needs no further payback. We are simply called to live our life for Christ and give him all that we are.

The thought and meditation that Isaac Watts put into the Passion scripture produced stanzas of poetry that have stood the test of time. This hymn has been sung through the ages and continues to educate Christians throughout the world about Christ's love.





OUTREACH





Holy Cross is one of 15 regional organizations that sponsor the Student Peace Awards of Fairfax County. This award program started in 2006 at Herndon High School with one sponsor, Herndon Friends meeting and has grown ever since. The mission of the initiative is to recognize students who focus on peace and justice through philanthropic work at their school, their community, and even internationally. On March 2, Vivian Jefferson represented HCLC at the ceremony. Vivian offered to attend because she told me she is inspired by the stories the students tell of their work to bring peace to others. As we reflect on world events, it is reassuring to know that students want to make a difference and that HCLC can play a part in their journey.





The wintery weather on January 20 made travel to the church treacherous, so the decision was made to delay the MLK Day event. The MLK Day of Service activities were moved to February 2 immediately after the church service in the Fellowship hall. The Herndon Woman's Club (HWC) partnered with HCLC members to assemble 4 service projects:

- Paracord Lanyards were braided for first responders to donate to *Operation Gratitude*.
- Rice Sock Compresses for *local wildlife rescue groups* –
 These socks can be microwaved and placed near wildlife nests to provide warmth during winter months.
- Blankets for *Project Linus* This organization gives blankets to children who have experienced trauma as a way to provide comfort.
- Personal Care Kits for Lutheran World Relief These kits are taken to refugee camps or remote villages as a source of care. We assembled 118 kits and have provisions to make more kits soon.

My favorite part of the day was talking with everyone as we assembled these projects. Helen Wolfe and Joy Heuer are actively involved in the HWC (Helen is the President!) and fostered lots of positive interactions with all the volunteers. Thanks to everyone who attended.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNERS (ELL) Spring Semester 2025

We started our spring semester English classes one week late due to bad weather in January. We again had to cancel class on February 12th due to another snow storm. I hope this is the last time for our students to miss class. I always email and text students if we have no school. Our students expect a weekly email to remind them of their class. I also text the students that don't have emails available.

We are teaching until May every Wednesday from 7:00-8:30 pm. Most of our students come by word of mouth or through both public library systems' publications and also find us on our church website. Some students find us through Google.

We have 21 registrations, which is less students than we normally have. Students are afraid to come to class due to the ongoing ICE raids. It doesn't matter whether they have legal issues or not, students are too scared to come to class.

We already handed out "Red Cards," which tells our immigrants their rights. The Red Cards come from the Immigrant Legal Resource Center (ILRC). All people in the United States, regardless of immigration status, have certain rights and protections under the U.S. Constitution. ILRC's Red Cards help people assert their rights and defend themselves in many situations, such as when ICE agents go to a home. We have three classes: beginners, basic, and intermediate English. Dayna teaches our beginners, Chip teaches our basic class, and Suzanne and I teach the intermediate class. I'm looking to buy new textbooks for our basic and intermediate students, as our current donated textbooks are out of print.

Did You Know?


- Stephen Ministers meet once a month for additional training and support.
