






SANCTUARY FLOWERS

What to Expect in Worship

Worship services can be intimidating for newcomers. While we try to make worship as accessible as possible for everyone, we know that some aspects can be confusing. Feel free to ask an usher or someone near you for help if you have any questions today. We are happy to help and want all voices to be included in praise to God.

Our worship style is traditional at Holy Cross. A full liturgy is used to focus our praise and prayers to God. Notes are included in the side gutter of the bulletin to explain why we use the various liturgical elements. Communion is celebrated every Sunday at Holy Cross. The table (altar) is not our table, but Christ's table. Just as Christ welcomes all, all are welcome to receive communion at Holy Cross. Pastor will give instructions on how we celebrate communion in a COVID safe manner at that part of the service. Written instructions are also included at that point in the bulletin.

Throughout the year we emphasize each liturgical season differently to mark the passage of time. Liturgical texts change to reflect aspects of that season, some elements are removed or added to reflect the mood of that season, and colors used to decorate the chancel are changed to provide visual reminders of the current season.

"On Jordan's Stormy Banks" is one of the most enduring hymns of Christian hope. Written in 1787 by Samuel Stennett, an English Baptist pastor, this hymn draws on the imagery of the Israelites standing at the River Jordan. looking across to the Promised Land. For generations of believers, that image has become a symbol of the faithful standing on the edge of death, gazing toward the eternal life promised by God.

Set to the vibrant American tune PROMISED LAND, the hymn expresses both longing and joy. Its steady rhythm and folk-style melody have made it a favorite in camp meetings, shapenote singing, and congregational worship alike.

In this Sunday's context, as Job declares, "I know that my Redeemer lives," and Jesus proclaims



LISTENING WITH CHILDREN'S EARS

FIRST READING Job 19:23-27a.

Job suffers the loss of children, wealth, and health. Accused by his companions of wrongdoing, he knows himself to be innocent. Here, in the midst of his suffering, Job clings to the radical hope that his vindicator, his redeemer, lives; and that one day he himself will see God.

Reader: A reading from the prophet Job.

²³ "O that my words were written down!
O that they were inscribed in a book!

²⁴O that with an iron pen and with lead they were engraved on a rock forever!

²⁵ For I know that my vindicator lives and that in the end he will stand upon the earth;

²⁶ and after my skin has been destroyed, then in my flesh I shall see God,

^{27a} whom I shall see on my side, and my eyes shall behold, and not another."

Reader: Word of God, word of life.

Assembly: Thanks be to God.

This passage is the section in Job most quoted by Christians since, when interpreted literally, it indicates a bodily life after death: "at the last" Job will "see" God. Thus the lectionary sets it next to Luke's discussion of the afterlife. To God, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, and Job are alive, and Christians expect the same for all helievers..

Humans are perennially fascinated with speculation about the end of the world. Christians have come to connect this description of "the lawless one" with the Johannine "antichrist" (1 John 2:18, 22). Lutherans can think of the evils of the end time as law, that is, the harsh truths of human existence, and the second half of the reading as gospel: God has chosen us, we are saved, we are made holy by the Spirit, we will share the glory of Christ, we are loved by God, we are comforted and strengthened by God's word.

SECOND READING

2 Thessalonians 2:1-5, 13-17

This portion of the letter provides encouragement for the church at Thessalonica during a time of confusion and opposition, as some allowed their concern over Jesus' imminent return to divert them from the central teachings of the gospel.

Reader: A reading from Paul's second letter to The Thessalonians.

¹ As to the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ and our being gathered together to him, we beg you, brothers and sisters, ² not to be quickly shaken in mind or alarmed, either by spirit or by word or by letter, as though from us, to the effect that the day of the Lord is already here. ³ Let no one deceive you in any way, for that day will not come unless the rebellion comes first and the lawless one is revealed, the one destined for destruction. ⁴ He opposes and exalts himself above every so-called god or object of worship, so that he takes his seat in the temple of God, declaring himself to be God. ⁵ Do you not remember that I told you these things when I was still with you?

¹³ But we must always give thanks to God for you, brothers and sisters beloved by the Lord, because God chose you as the first fruits for salvation through sanctification by the Spirit and through belief in the truth. ¹⁴ For this purpose he called you through our gospel, so that you may obtain the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ. ¹⁵ So then, brothers and sisters, stand firm and hold fast to the traditions that you were taught by us, either by word of mouth or by our letter.

¹⁶ Now may our Lord Jesus Christ himself and God our Father, who loved us and through grace gave us eternal comfort and good hope, ¹⁷ comfort your hearts and strengthen them in every good work and word.

Reader: Word of God, word of life.

Assembly: Thanks be to God.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

(Setting 1)



Lord, to whom shall we go? You hav

You have the words of e-ter-nal life.

GOSPEL Luke 20:27-38

Some Sadducees, who do not believe in the resurrection of the dead, try to trap Jesus. They formulate the convoluted case of a serial widow who marries a succession of seven brothers. Jesus responds by teaching about God to whom all are alive and in whom all relationships are fulfilled.

Pastor: The Gospel according to Luke the 20th chapter.

Assembly: Glory to you, O Lord.

²⁷ Some Sadducees, those who say there is no resurrection, came to [Jesus] ²⁸ and asked him a question: "Teacher, Moses wrote for us that if a man's brother dies leaving a wife but no children, the man shall marry the widow and raise up children for his brother. ²⁹ Now there were seven brothers; the first married a woman and died childless; ³⁰ then the second ³¹ and the third married her, and so in the same way all seven died childless. ³² Finally the woman also died. ³³ In the resurrection, therefore, whose wife will the woman be? For the seven had married her."

³⁴ Jesus said to them, "Those who belong to this age marry and are given in marriage, ³⁵ but those who are considered worthy of a place in that age and in the resurrection from the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage. ³⁶ Indeed, they cannot die anymore, because they are like angels and are children of God, being children of the resurrection. ³⁷ And the fact that the dead are raised Moses himself showed, in the story about the bush, where he speaks of the Lord as the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob. ³⁸ Now he is God not of the dead but of the living, for to him all of them are alive." Do to others as you would have them do to you."

Pastor: The Gospel of our Lord. **Assembly:** Praise to you, O Christ.

The Sadducees meant to ridicule speculation about an afterlife. However, even this passage has served to feed Christian imagination about an angelic existence in the afterlife. The New Testament describes Jesus Christ as the first to experience resurrection, and believers continue to hope that the God of the living will be their God even after death. The New Testament proclaims the resurrection of the body, not the immortal soul that is currently believed by many Christians and affirmed by many clergy. Attention to the end of all things is fitting at the close of each liturgical year.

HYMN OF THE DAY – Stanzas 1, 2, 5 & 8

(ELW #886)

I Know That My Redeemer Lives!



- 5 He lives to bless me with his love; he lives to plead for me above; he lives my hungry soul to feed; he lives to help in time of need.
- 6 He lives, my kind, wise, heav'nly friend; he lives and loves me to the end; he lives, and while he lives, I'll sing; he lives, my prophet, priest, and king!
- 7 He lives and grants me daily breath; he lives, and I shall conquer death; he lives my mansion to prepare; he lives to bring me safely there.
- 8 He lives, all glory to his name! He lives, my Savior, still the same; what joy this blest assurance gives: I know that my Redeemer lives!

Few hymns proclaim the hope of resurrection as boldly as "I Know That My Redeemer Lives." Written in 1775 by Samuel Medley, a former Royal Navy officer turned Baptist minister, the text takes its inspiration directly from Job 19:25: "I know that my Redeemer lives." Though Job spoke those words in the midst of pain and loss, they have become a triumphant declaration of Easter faith.

In light of today's readings, which assure us that God is "not of the dead, but of the living," this hymn gathers Job's ancient trust, Paul's encouragement, and Jesus' promise into one resounding confession: Christ lives, and because he lives, so shall we.






DISTRIBUTION HYMN

(ELW #622)

Neither Death nor Life



Stanza 1: Cantor

Dwell in the one who raised Christ from the dead; though your body shall die, in Christ you shall rise through the Spirit who brings you to life. Refrain

Stanza 2: Cantor

All who are led by the Spirit shall live as children of God, and heirs with Christ Jesus, God's adopted and chosen and loved. Refrain

Stanza 3: Cantor

All of the suffring we now must endure is nothing to the glory so soon to be revealed when creation itself is set free. Refrain

Rooted in Paul's words from Romans 8, this hymn proclaims the unshakable assurance that nothing—not death, nor life, nor anything else in all creation—can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus. In the mystery of communion, we experience that very promise: Christ's living presence unites us with all believers, past and present, in one body of hope and реасе.

As we sing, we affirm with Job and with the Gospel that the love of God is stronger than death and holds us all in eternal life.

Drawn from Romans 14:7–9, this simple yet profound hymn confesses that our entire existence, life and death alike, belongs to the Lord. At the table of grace, we are reminded that Christ's lordship is not limited to this world but extends into eternity.

Singing these words during communion becomes an act of surrender and trust: whatever comes, we belong to Christ, who is Lord of both the living and the dead.

All of creation awaits the new birth, the fullness of redemption, through labor pains of love, and so we wait in patience and hope. Refrain





THIS WEEK'S COMMEMORATIONS

Martin, Bishop of Tours, died 397 Tuesday, November 11, 2025

Martin's pagan father enlisted him in the Roman army. Approached by a beggar, Martin cut his cloak in half and gave part to the man, whom he later understood as representing Christ. He asked to leave the army, but was jailed instead. After his release, he became a preacher, and later a bishop.

Søren Aabye Kierkegaard, teacher, died 1855 Tuesday, November 11, 2025

Kierkegaard was a Danish theologian whose writings also gave rise to the modern philosophy of existentialism. He frequently attacked the complacency of the state church of his day, as well as its desire to be accepted by polite society rather than be a stumbling block.

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FROM THE CLOUD OF WITNESSES

[Ruth Caspar, OP, in Homilies for the Christian People, 539-540.]

The foundational belief of Christian anthropology is not the immortality of the soul but resurrection of the dead. It is our embodied human person that will be the continuation of our existence in eternal life, and not a disembodied soul or spirit. Mysterious as this must seem, it has profound implications regarding the holiness of our bodies. No Christian can despise the human body, and surely none should abuse it. All that we do to promote our own health and that of others, through good nutrition and fitness, all the legitimate pleasures that our bodies offer, all the labors that we do with our hands—all are part of the created order that will be transformed in the resurrection. Paul in his letter to the Thessalonians speaks of the eternal consolation that the Father has given us out of mercy, and Jesus in his response to the Sadducees in today's gospel has named that consolation. Having been fed by God's word, we now profess our faith in the resurrection, and then celebrate the meal that is the promise of that eternal life.
