

DIRECTOR OF MUSIC AND LITURGY

One of my favorite hymns to sing on Easter Sunday is *The Strife Is O'er, the Battle Done*. The text of this hymn is a translation by Francis Pott of the Latin original *Finita iam sunt praelia*.



Imagery of Christ taking human form and battling death permeates this hymn. Looking at Christ's saving work as doing battle with the devil, rather than paying ransom for the sins of men or showing never-ending love, was common in the early Middle Ages and somewhat revived again by Martin Luther.

In present times, hymn texts are more likely to lean in the direction of Christ's love rather than Christ's battle over death. Phrases such as, "but the pains which he endured, our salvation have procured," or, "The risen Christ, who walks on wounded feet from his garden tomb." are more likely to be seen from hymn writers today. However, Pott uses language like, "The strife is o'er, the battle done," or, "The pow'rs of death have done their worst; Jesus their legions has dispersed." Equally powerful, language about the love of Christ and the power of Christ both have their place in our hymnody.



After not singing the word "Alleluia" for 40 days Francis Pott adds three bold "Alleluias" to start and end this hymn. An "Alleluia" can also be found at the end of each stanza. In combination with a fanfare like hymn tune (composed by one of the greatest medieval composers, Giovanni Palestrina) these "Alleluias" are a powerful addition to any Easter service.

Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia!

The strife is o'er, the battle done; now is the victor's triumph won! Now be the song of praise begun. Alleluia!

The pow'rs of death have done their worst; Jesus their legions has dispersed. Let shouts of holy joy outburst. Alleluia!

The three sad days have quickly sped, Christ rises glorious from the dead. All glory to our risen head! Alleluia!

Christ closed the yawning gates of hell; the bars from heav'ns high portals fell. Let hymns of praise his triumph tell. Alleluia!

Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia!



OUTREACH





Holy Cross Lutheran Church is one of 15 sponsors of the Student Peace Awards of Fairfax County, a program that recognizes high school students engaged in social justice activities. Students who are nominated by their school receive an award of \$250 and have the opportunity to direct an additional \$250 to a nonprofit organization that represents their focus area.



I attended the awards ceremony as a representative of HCLC on March 2. Every year, I am amazed at the drive and motivation of young people who balance homework, family obligations, and other extra-curricular activities and still find time to organize service projects.



Many of the school projects this year were designed to promote intercultural understanding from the perspective of Muslim and Jewish students.

Other programs addressed the needs of immigrants, people who have disabilities, or students who are experiencing food insecurity. The awardees provided advocacy, tutoring services, as well as emotional support.

At a time when many adults are feeling hopeless and helpless about conflicts throughout the world, these students are taking action at the grassroots level to do what they can to directly help other people. They can provide an example for all of us!

There are several ways to give when you're not in the sanctuary:

- 1. Go to our secure website and click "Donate" to set up a onetime or recurring donation through Vanco.
- Download the free Vanco Mobile app. Once it's downloaded, you can use our Invite code, 24A7NT to ensure you are linked to the correct church, and login with your current Vanco credentials (whether from the GivePlus app or our website's Donation page. If you do not have an account, you will be prompted to set one up.
- 3. You can also make a single or recurring check donation to the church by using Bill Pay with your bank or credit union online account or mobile app. Those payments are guaranteed and are shown in your bank or credit union records.
