What to Expect in Worship

Worship services can be intimidating for newcomers. While we try to make worship as accessible as possible for everyone, we know that some aspects can be confusing. Feel free to ask an usher or someone near you for help if you have any questions today. We are happy to help and want all voices to be included in praise to God.

Our worship style is traditional at Holy Cross. A full liturgy is used to focus our praise and prayers to God. Notes are included in the side gutter of the bulletin to explain why we use the various liturgical elements. Communion is celebrated every Sunday at Holy Cross. The table (altar) is not our table, but Christ's table. Just as Christ welcomes all, all are welcome to receive communion at Holy Cross. Pastor will give instructions on how we celebrate communion in a COVID safe manner at that part of the service. Written instructions are also included at that point in the bulletin.

Throughout the year we emphasize each liturgical season differently to mark the passage of time. Liturgical texts change to reflect aspects of that season, some elements are removed or added to reflect the mood of that season, and colors used to decorate the chancel are changed to provide visual reminders of the current season.

LISTENING WITH CHILDREN'S EARS

FIRST READING

1 Kings 19:15-16, 19-21

In the story preceding today's reading, the prophet Elijah flees for his life to the security of God's mountain. There God reveals to Elijah that there are still other faithful people in Israel and commissions him to anoint new leaders, including his own successor, Elisha.

Reader: A reading from the first book of Kings

¹⁵ Then the LORD said to [Elijah], "Go, return on your way to the wilderness of Damascus; when you arrive, you shall anoint Hazael as

God. The parallel makes clear that the evangelists understood Jesus' ministry in light of Israel's prophetic tradition.

When we don the mantle of our baptism and follow Jesus, our lives are radically changed, from actions that protect and aggrandize the self to attitudes that value and nurture the community. For such a life we are empowered, not by any inherent human inclinations, but rather by the Spirit of the risen Christ. Would that "the works of the flesh" are as obvious as Paul suggests.

king over Aram. ¹⁶ Also you shall anoint Jehu son of Nimshi as king over Israel, and you shall anoint Elisha son of Shaphat of Abelmeholah as prophet in your place.

¹⁹ So he set out from there and found Elisha son of Shaphat, who was plowing. There were twelve yoke of oxen ahead of him, and he was with the twelfth. Elijah passed by him and threw his mantle over him. ²⁰ He left the oxen, ran after Elijah, and said, "Let me kiss my father and my mother, and then I will follow you." Then Elijah said to him, "Go back again, for what have I done to you?" ²¹ He returned from following him, took the yoke of oxen, and slaughtered them; using the equipment from the oxen, he boiled their flesh and gave it to the people, and they ate. Then he set out and followed Elijah and became his servant.

Reader: Word of God, word of life.

Assembly: Thanks be to God.

SECOND READING

Galatians 5:1, 13-25

For Paul, the freedom Christ gives is not permission to do whatever we want. It is the invitation to be what we could not be otherwise. The power and guidance of Christ's Holy Spirit produce a different kind of life, one marked by the fruit of this Holy Spirit.

Reader: A reading from Paul's letter to the Galatians:

¹ For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery.

¹³ For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters, only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become enslaved to one another. ¹⁴ For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." ¹⁵ If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another.

¹⁶ Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. ¹⁷ For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit desires is opposed to the flesh, for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you want. ¹⁸ But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not subject to the law. ¹⁹ Now the works of the flesh are obvious: sexual immorality, impurity, debauchery, ²⁰ idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions, ²¹ envy, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these. I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God.

²² By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, ²³ gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. ²⁴ And those who belong to Christ have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. ²⁵ If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit.

⁵⁷ As they were going along the road, someone said to him, "I will follow you wherever you go." ⁵⁸ And Jesus said to him, "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere

Now it is we who are called both to tolerate nonbelievers and to leave all to follow Christ as we proclaim the kingdom. The challenge is to apply the radicalness of Jesus' words to our lives in the world.

HYMN OF THE DAY

O Jesus, I Have Promised




In today's Gospel reading, Jesus offers his followers a sobering challenge: "Let the dead bury their own dead," and "No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God." His words remind us that the call to discipleship demands courage, commitment, and a willingness to follow even when the journey is long and the way is hard.

Our Hymn of the Day gives voice to our response to that call. Written from the first-person perspective, it expresses both our desire and our struggle to walk faithfully with Christ.

Anglican priest John Bode composed the

text for the confirmation of his three children, offering it as a prayer and a promise. When the hymn was first published in 1869, it was paired with a verse from today's Gospel, Luke 9:57: "I will follow you wherever you go."

The hymn also echoes the themes of our reading from Paul's letter to the Galatians. In particular, the third stanza serves as a reminder of Paul's urging to turn away from the works of the flesh and to bear the fruits of the Spirit as we follow Christ.

Just a Closer Walk with Thee




Text: North American traditional Music: CLOSER WALK, North American traditional Today's call is clear: those who would walk with Christ must not look back, but rather offer their whole selves in service to His kingdom.

Written by Frances Ridley Havergal in 1874, this beloved hymn began as a simple, personal prayer of dedication. Havergal, a devout Anglican and prolific hymn writer, penned the text after visiting friends and sensing that God was calling *her—and those around* her—to a deeper commitment of heart and life. The hymn expresses a desire to consecrate every part of ourselves—our time, our talents, our possessions—to Christ's service. *In the spirit of today's* Gospel, "Take My Life, That I May Be" invites us to respond to Christ's call with humility and courage, offering all that we are to the work of God's kingdom.

Though the precise origins of this hymn are not fully known, it is widely attributed to the testimony of a man from Assam, India, who, after converting to Christianity in the 19th century, declared these words as an expression of his unwavering faith—even in the face of

THIS WEEK'S COMMEMORATIONS

Peter and Paul, Apostles Sunday, June 29, 2025

These two strong-willed apostles are the pillars of the church in the first generation after Christ. Peter was one of the Twelve, one who both offered a glorious confession of faith and later denied knowing Jesus. Paul once led the persecution of Christians, then was converted and helped bring the faith to non-Jewish people.

Catherine Winkworth, died 1878; John Mason Neale, died 1866; hymn translators

Tuesday, July 1, 2025

Neale was an English priest who specialized in the translation of Latin and Greek hymns into English. Winkworth lived in Manchester, England, and devoted herself to translating German hymns. Almost all English-speaking hymnals include many of their translations.

Thomas, Apostle Thursday, July 3, 2025

Though frequently remembered as "doubting Thomas," this apostle also demonstrated a willingness to suffer and die with Jesus (John 11:16), and finally claimed the risen Christ as "my Lord and my God!" By tradition, he later worked as a missionary in India. Long commemorated on December 21, Thomas's celebration is moved to July 3 in agreement with ecumenical calendars.
